

#### Something New for the New Church Year



Most of you know that the church year begins with Advent, the four Sundays before Christmas. As we begin a new church year, we're also beginning a new cycle through the three year lectionary we use in worship. Each year, A, B and C, the lectionary focuses on Matthew, Mark or Luke, with John used in all three years around holidays and festivals.

Working our way through the three year cycle, we end up reading about a third of the bible in worship, which gives us a very good overview of scripture. The readings also reflect different themes for different seasons, which helps us use the church calendar as another resource for growing in faith as we emphasize different aspects of our faith throughout the year. I appreciate that the lectionary lifts up some readings I would probably not choose on my own. It also ties us together with the many churches around the world who read the same bible passages as we do week after week.

The Gospel reading is the key text for each day. Through much of the year, the epistle reading is chosen to lift up some of the same themes as the gospel. During the time after Pentecost (also called Ordinary time because we name the Sundays with ordinal numbers), we switch to reading through significant portions of the letters in the New Testament, so we will get a few weeks in a row from the same book.

As long as I've been a pastor, the congregations I've served have used the "complementary" readings from the Old Testament. This means the readings are selected based on the themes from the gospel, so all the readings complement one another. The psalm is a response to the first reading, so it picks up on the same themes as well.

This year, we'll try something different. We're going to use the "semicontinuous readings" for the Old Testament and the Psalm. This means during all those green Sundays after Pentecost, we'll start in Genesis and read selections from the Old Testament in canonical order. This year, we'll read parts of Genesis, Exodus, Deuteronomy, Joshua and Judges - from the call of Abraham to God's people settling in the Promised Land and their struggles to stay faithful. In Year B (2026-2027), we'll work our way through 1 and 2 Samuel, 1 Kings, Proverbs, Job, Esther and Ruth. In Year C (2027-2028), we'll work our way through the prophets.

I'm looking forward to refreshing ourselves on so much of the story of God and his faithful people in worship. I think we will see new connections between the Old Testament and the New Testament. I think we will discover parts of the story we may have missed along the way. I think we will enjoy hearing the ways God has been at work among his people through the generations.

It's not a huge change or adjustment, but I think the chance to change up a bit of what we hear in worship will get us to listen a little differently. I pray that the Holy Spirit will give us eyes to see and ears to hear what God has to say in scripture in the years to come.

## Gift of Energy
















Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
